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# Environment and Purpose of Credentialing

- Credentialing in technical fields (usually called certification) has been used for 20+ years to verify an individual's ability
- Credentialing is becoming more prevalent in Emergency Management, especially where mutual aid may be utilized
- The State of California has a credentialing program for EOC positions
- Served agencies are increasingly aware of credentialing and are expecting team members to be credentialed
- SCCo ARES/RACES has had a credentialing program for Mutual Aid Communicators since 2009
- We can better support our served agencies by expanding our credentialing program to all operators (not just MACs)

# Goals for Enhanced SCCo RACES Credentials

- Provide opportunities for everyone to earn credentials
  - No need to take an assignment outside one's home city
- Expand number of credentialed operators who can respond to a given location
  - In-city operators plus MACs
- Use proven (10 years) methods from the MAC program to identify qualified people
- Make it easier to predefine requirements for any assignment
  - Served agencies know what to ask for
- Reassure served agencies of assigned operator's capabilities
- Maintain consistency and integrity of credentials
  - Objective; no "gotchas"; no "gimmes"

The Type IV Communicator credential has essentially the same as the former entry-level Mutual Aid Communicator, minus the requirement to commit to mutual aid support

# Credential Requirements

- Prerequisites
  - Communicator Type IV: administrative
  - Other credentials
- Training
  - ARES/RACES Training
  - Emergency Management Training (FEMA, CSTI, SCCo OEM)
- Participation / Experience
  - Nets, exercises, public service events, emergency incidents
- Equipment
  - Standard, credential-specific
- Knowledge
  - Radio/station familiarity, managing problems
- Operator Skill
  - Peer-reviewed performance during an exercise/event/incident

# Evaluations

- Communicator Type IV performance is evaluated by the local jurisdiction's Radio Officer
- All other credentials: evaluated by Credential Evaluator
  - Has same or higher-level technical credential
  - Also holds a credential in how to perform fair, objective evaluation
- Sounds scary, but isn't
  - Operate your position as normal; evaluator is a silent observer
    - May inject additional traffic, depending on the situation
  - Follow SCCo ARES/RACES Performance Standards & Best Practices
  - Net operations, message passing, paperwork according to our training
  - Do it right and pass
  - If you mess up, study and practice more, then try again

# Credential Award Process

- Track progress
  - Each candidate is responsible for tracking their own progress
- Obtain sign-offs
  - Communicator Type IV: local jurisdiction Radio Officer
  - All other credentials: Credential Evaluator
- Submit documentation
  - To the Credential Program Manager or Evaluator
- Records review and update
  - By Credential Program Manager or Evaluator
- Notification
  - Typically by e-mail
- Print and laminate updated wallet card

# Endorsement Overview

Builds on minimum technical credentials

Adds agency-specific requirements

# Endorsements

- Identify resources that have the required RACES credentials  
\*AND\* meet the additional, agency-specific requirements

## Endorsements

### Additional Agency-specific Requirements

- Administrative
- Training
- Experience
- Other ...

### Prerequisites

- Technical Credentials (F#, N#, P#, S#, H#)
- Other Endorsements

# Existing Endorsements

- Mutual Aid Communicator
  - Communicator Type IV credential, plus ...
- County Fire Station Radio Operator
  - Field Operator Type III and Packet Operator Type III credentials, plus ...
- County EOC Radio Operator
  - Net Control Type III or Packet Operator Type III
  - Mutual Aid Communicator endorsement, plus ...
- County EOC RACES Unit Leader
  - Net Control Type II and Packet Operator Type II
  - County EOC Radio Operator endorsement, plus ...

# Wallet Card

- Each credentialed operator can print and laminate their own wallet card
- Card expires annually, at end of January
- Reprint each February 1
- Keep with other ID badges from local jurisdiction and county
- Use when checking into resource net or staging

# Communicator Type IV

## 2) Go back and review details of Communicator Type IV

- Most active hams are probably 90% of the way done already!

### ***Communicator Type IV Credential***

Phonetic designation for radio transmission is "Charlie Four"

#### ***Summary***

##### ***Capabilities and Services***

- Capable of performing basic communications assignments, perhaps with coaching
- Capable of handling low-to-medium traffic levels and simple operator-to-operator content
- May be deployed for up to 8 to 12-hour shift (but is prepared for 12 hours in the event of unforeseen problems)
- Equipped for portable and low-power mobile operations

##### ***Typical Assignments***

- Field checkpoints and observations posts; rovers
- Damage surveys: Windshield surveys, Modified Mercalli surveys; flood level observations
- Crowd observation and reporting; public information assistance
- Lost child / lost parent assistance

#### ***Requirements***

##### ***Administrative***

- Must live or work in Santa Clara County or be an active participant in RACES activities within Santa Clara County, and must be willing and able to respond to requests for amateur radio support in their primary jurisdiction within Santa Clara County.
  - Individuals will pick a primary jurisdiction, which is the jurisdiction that will have first priority if the individual is needed. This is typically the individual's home city or the city where the individual works.
  - Note: Those seeking the Mutual Aid Communicator Endorsement can pick any primary jurisdiction within Santa Clara County, but if their primary jurisdiction doesn't need them, they must be willing and able to respond to requests elsewhere within Santa Clara County.
- Must be 18 years of age or older
- Must have a valid Technician class or higher Amateur Radio license
- Must have a valid California Driver's license or California State-issued Identification card
- Must have reliable transportation capable of meeting the needs of the assignment
- Must have read and be familiar with the entire "SCCo ARES/RACES Radio Operator Credentiaing Program Handbook" (this document)
- Must have read and be familiar with the entire "SCCo ARES/RACES Performance Standards and Best Practices"
- Must be registered as a Disaster Service Worker Volunteer with their primary jurisdiction (the jurisdiction that is signing off on this credential)

## 4) Sign the back

- Commit to minimum participation level and to operating according to standards
- Radio Officer also signs

# For Radio Officers: Communicator Type IV

- Similar to former MAC program
- Verification process is now written out in one place – easy to follow instructions

## Verification Process

### Step 1: Verify Requirements

The local jurisdiction Radio Officer (or designated deputy radio officer) will verify that the candidate has met each of the above requirements by initialing the corresponding entry on the candidate's Type IV Communicator Credential Record. To accomplish this step, follow the process below:

#### General

- Read the Communicator Type IV requirements (previous section) and make sure each requirement is understood. No one should sign off on a requirement that they don't understand.
- Note: The checklist on the Communicator Type IV Credential Record form is a very abbreviated version of the requirements. The Program Handbook (this document) always takes precedence over all other program documents.

#### Administrative

- Verify that the candidate meets each of the requirements

#### Training

- Verify that the candidate has completed each of the required SCCo ARES/RACES courses
- Verify that the candidate has completed each of the required Emergency Management courses

#### Equipment

- Verify that the candidate has all required items for the SCCo ARES/RACE Standard 2-hour Carry Kit
- Verify that the candidate has all required items for the SCCo ARES/RACE Standard 12-hour Go Kit
- Verify both kits are in a deployable condition (see description in requirements above)

#### Knowledge

- Have the candidate demonstrate they can set their HT to each of the required configurations using only the keypad (no computer), without delay or hesitation, and without the use of documentation (such as user manuals, cheat sheets).
- To verify simplex with tone squelch
  - Candidate sets correct tone and tone squelch
  - Person verifying sets tone and tone squelch, first with wrong tone to verify no communication in either direction (it is common for new operators to not properly set tone squelch)
  - Then person verifying sets correct tone to verify communication in both directions

#### Participation

- Verify that the candidate has completed the minimum quantity of nets
- Verify that the candidate has operated the radio for at least one hour at each of the minimum quantity of each type of drill, exercise and public service event or incident. (Monitoring or observing, while useful, is not sufficient to satisfy the participation requirements.)

# Communicator Type IV Award

- Submit to the Program Manager
  - Credential Record (checklist)
  - Training certificates
  - Recommendation from local jurisdiction Radio Officer
  - (BTW, this is all in the Program Handbook!)
- Program manager will
  - Review records
    - Check training and participation records in activities database
  - Update activities database
  - Notify candidate
- Candidate prints and laminates wallet card

# Mutual Aid Communicator Endorsement

- In most cases, impacted cities will be short of resources
  - If your city is impacted, you'll appreciate help from others
  - Can you offer the same help to others?
  - If not, that's OK. But if you can, please do!
- It's easy:
  1. Earn Communicator Type IV (or higher) credential
  2. Agree to accept assignments anywhere in the county
  3. Register as SCCo DSW
  4. LiveScan and background check by SCCo Sheriff
  5. Recommendation from local jurisdiction Radio Officer
  6. Radio familiarity check by Credential Evaluator

# Action Items for Existing Credential Holders

- Communicator Type IV
  - G606 “Intro to SEMS” is new requirement
  - Existing MACs have until 12/31/2020 to complete this class and submit certificate from CSTI (State of California)
- All Type II credentials
  - IS-800 “Intro to National Response Framework” is a new requirement
  - Existing Type II credential holders have until 12/31/2020 to complete this class and submit certificate from FEMA

# Most Common Questions

- Why the 2-year time limit for completing requirements for a given credential?
  - We are constantly improving our procedures, training, documentation
  - To be relevant, training and experience needs to be current
  - Note: No time limit on EM courses (FEMA, CSTI, SCCo OEM)
- How/where do I submit records, training certificates?
  - The program manager e-mail alias
